HOOD RIVER WATERSHED GROUP 2023 Annual Report





Greetings Watershed Community!

2023 was a year of acceleration for the Watershed Group. We completed a fish passage project that had been on Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's priority list for decades. We also directed the development of four large restoration projects for implementation in 2024 and 2025, which will remediate fish passage barriers and add hundreds of pieces of large wood back into our rivers and streams. Our community connections increased as well, with many new faces at our Watershed Group meetings, new business partners, and four new members joining our 9-member board. And finally, our annual budget was over \$1 million, which is a strong showing for our first full year as a nonprofit organization!

We could not have achieved these accomplishments without the strong support of our Watershed Group community and partners. Our dedicated board members have provided inspiring suggestions (like the pie auction at our Annual Celebration!) and dedicated oversight as we forged new procedures and practices. Volunteers have removed hundreds of Himalayan blackberry plants, planted dozens of native trees and shrubs, and helped nurture the new plantings with water and mulch. Finally, our partners leaned into our Focused Investment Partnership grant application to the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board, which culminated in an award in April 2024!

We are grateful for everyone's contributions and excited for the future!



The Hood River Watershed Group works with private landowners, community members, irrigation districts, tribes, and agencies to improve watershed health through stream and riparian habitat restoration, irrigation modernization, fish screening at water diversions, fish passage barrier removal, monitoring, and more.



Tony Creek Fish Passage Project

In the summer of 2023, the Watershed Group, in partnership and with funding from the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs (CTWS) and Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, restored fish passage at a diversion dam on Tony Creek that had blocked upstream passage since 1965. Tony Creek is an important clearwater tributary to the glacial Middle Fork Hood River, with populations of ESA-listed spring Chinook, winter steelhead, coho, and bull trout, as well as resident cutthroat trout. To restore fish passage, we rebuilt 300 feet of the creek below the dam, widening the channel to spread out the energy of the creek, creating backwater resting pools, and raising the channel bed so fish can pass over the dam and access five miles of cold, clearwater habitat.



Neal Creek Habitat Restoration

In 2023, the Watershed Group began designing a third phase of restoration along Neal Creek on Hood River County forest land with funding from CTWS. The project will enhance two miles of Neal Creek by returning a section of the creek to its historic channel length and adding approximately 690 pieces of large wood to the channel, resulting in the reconnection of over 20 acres of floodplain. This project builds upon Phase 1 and 2 of Neal Creek habitat restoration, which were constructed in 2021 and 2022 and restored a total of 1.25 miles of Neal Creek and its floodplain for juvenile rearing and adult holding and spawning habitat. Construction is planned for the summer of 2024.



Baldwin Creek Fish Passage & Habitat Enhancement

Baldwin Creek is a clearwater tributary to the Lower East Fork Hood River with populations of winter steelhead, coho, and resident trout. The Watershed Group worked with five private landowners on a design that will enhance 1.25 miles of instream habitat, improve passage to approximately two miles of stream, and reconnect up to 11 acres of floodplain on Baldwin Creek. Work will include replacing an undersized, perched culvert with an arched stream simulation culvert, creating a roughened channel to eliminate the passage barrier at the diversion dam, reconnecting the floodplain, and improving instream habitat with large wood structures.





Lower East Fork Habitat Restoration

The Watershed Group, in partnership with CTWS, is developing a series of habitat restoration projects along the Lower East Fork Hood River, a biologically important river for spring Chinook, winter steelhead, and coho salmon. In 2023, we initiated design work for two phases of restoration, working with 13 private landowners to enhance spawning and rearing habitat along approximately 2.5 miles of river. 2023 design work was funded by CTWS.



Community Engagement

The Watershed Group held six public presentations in 2023, with topics including freshwater mussels and environmental justice in river restoration. You can re-watch all presentations on our website. In April, we hosted an Earth Day weeding and planting work party along Indian Creek with 20 volunteers. Thank you to our volunteers and the Jubitz Family Foundation for supporting this work!



Monitoring

The Watershed Group annually monitors restoration projects to evaluate if restoration actions are having their intended effect and to improve future projects. In 2023, the Watershed Group initiated the development of a basin-wide monitoring plan for the Hood River Basin Partnership that will help the Partnership measure progress in implementing restoration, conservation, and water quality projects



In 2024, the Watershed Group will be implementing the Neal Creek Phase 3 and Baldwin Creek projects, continuing the Lower East Fork Hood River design development, conducting a feasibility and conceptual design study of the Powerdale Corridor, hiring a Watershed Technician, and hosting presentations and volunteer work parties!
